3. From Pastor Ruth Ann and Pastor Ray at LDR

a. **Crisis Cleanup needs phone volunteers**. You work from home, use your own computer to take and record calls. We will add you as a member of our team and you can take the short online training and start to work! There are hundreds of calls needing to be answered!

This can be done from anywhere in the US. You only need a computer and internet service. Training is provided.

b. NC VOAD (NC Voluntary Organizations Active in Disasters) anticipates a need for volunteers to staff Points of Distribution (PODs). No experience needed. Volunteers might be passing out bottled water, hygiene kits, or cleaning supplies, for example. If you would like to volunteer, email: mail@ncvoad.org *UPDATE: North Carolina expects to open a warehouse in the Charlotte-Mooresville area this Saturday, 10/12, and needs volunteers to operate it. The contents will initially include donations and supplies for survivors and transition to building materials for recovery.

North Carolina expects to need 100 volunteers each day. Volunteers should be from the Charlotte-Mooresville area since housing cannot be provided.

They also would like to find a few managers who could work for a longer period, scheduling volunteer groups to work for shorter periods of a week or two.

c. An urgent need is for the first Volunteer Reception Center (VRC) to be opened in Western NC on Friday.

The United Way Offices (CEO Dan LeRoy) at 50 South French Broad Street is going to be the site. Timeline: training by zoom 10/16, open the VRC 10/18.

The general idea: people eager to volunteer are showing up at PODs and Comfort Care Stations in numbers greater than can be effectively used at each location. Those volunteers will be directed to the VRC as well as anyone who wants to volunteer to help, either local or from NC or out of state. The Volunteer Reception Center will register people and then send them to sites where their willingness and skills can be more effective. The list of sites for volunteers will come from the various county and volunteer organizations. At the VRC, a person's information and skill set will be noted.

They will sign a waiver and get safety training and information on a volunteer site.

The VRC will be open 7 days a week from 6am-1pm for at least a month (brings us to Thanksgiving) at 50 South French Broad Street. The daily staffing needs will be 12-15 people. It is estimated at 60-70+ people will show up daily. The flow of work at the VRC will be adapted as needed.

Having a VRC will be a huge assistance to the recovery process, more effectively utilizing volunteers. It is being set up at the request of the County/City and coordinated by FEMA.

VRC volunteers will be public facing, interacting with eager volunteers and potentially with community citizens who are looking for help and frustrated.

7. CIC has:

- a. A group of men spent the day on 10/12 at Lutheridge helping them become more accessible as a resource for aid in the area.
 - i. Be on the lookout for similar day trips in the near and distant future.
- b. Assembled 20 more Children's Comfort Kits
- c. Knitters donated all of their current hat and scarf inventory and Pastor Michael delivered them to a collection site at Grace Lutheran Church in Boone.
- d. The quilters will direct this year's quilts to Western North Carolina after their blessing in November.
